Foreword: Indiana Green: 10th Year Anniversary Exhibition

We humans like to mark time. Formally observing its passage is one of the ways we have an appearance of control over it. While there are many ways we do this, marking the anniversaries of significant events offers us a particularly communal form of celebration. Unlike one's own birthdays, which can sometimes compel private reflection, the anniversary of a happening like the first Indiana Green exhibition requires us to think about where we are as a group. In this case, the milestone anniversary of an itinerant art show allows us to think about where we are as a contemporary visual art community in our corner of the Upper Midwest - and about how that community has evolved since the first Indiana Green exhibition ten years ago.

In addition to the chance to reflect on the past and take stock of the present moment, an anniversary is an opportunity to project forward into the future, to make a conjecture about where we will go from here. On the occasion of Indiana Green's fifth anniversary exhibition, in 2014, MOWA's Director of Collections and Exhibitions (and unofficial best-dressed winner and ring-leader among us curator types) Graeme Reid wrote, "One can only hope that by year 10, artists from throughout the state will be clamoring to be featured." Here we are at year 10 and I think it's safe to say that there is a rather loud clamor from many corners to participate in Indiana Green; the exhibition's profile, reach, and ambitions have expanded with each year's offering. From Wisconsin and Illinois - the original and steadfast geographic loci of the show - to as far afield as Oregon (the state, not the town due south of Madison), this year artist-curators Frank Juarez and Melissa Dorn have selected 49 artists working in a wide range of media from that cacophonous din to feature in Indiana Green: 10th Year Anniversary Exhibition.

One major change for me as a curator of contemporary art since that first Indiana Green group show has been the increasingly useful presence of Instagram in learning about artists' work and their studio practices. Indeed, Instagram launched six months after Indiana Green premiered, in October 2010. Yes, I'll admit it: I'm happily addicted to IG and I definitely use it as a tool to keep track of artists whose work and studio practices intrigue and interest me. There are several artists in this anniversary exhibition whose work I've admired on IG and then sought out at solo and group shows in real life, many of whom I haven't even met in person yet. But if how we look at and share artwork has changed over the past decade, other aspects of Indiana Green have remained more or less consistent. In addition to many new artists in this exhibition, there are a few that have been featured in the show several times over the years, offering the devoted viewer a glimpse of the evolving processes and shifting concerns in their work.

There are artists featured in Indiana Green: 10th Year Anniversary Exhibition whose work I know intimately, either because we've worked together or because I own a piece of theirs myself; there are artists whose work I know just from IG, or a show somewhere in the state, or from another curator's recommendation; and there are certainly a few artists in the show whose work I don't know at all yet. One of the many joys of each year's iteration of Indiana Green is the chance to see old friends and meet new ones. The element that links these 49 artists - the element that has linked the artists in all the Indiana Green shows over the years - is their deep investment in their art practice, their chosen media, and the ideas that drive their creative work.

From our perspective here in 2019, that first Indiana Green exhibition can be retrospectively read as crucial to the evolution and increased prominence of contemporary art in our region. The continuation of Indiana Green as an annual show after the success of that first exhibition seems nearly as inevitable - though legend has it that Frank initially conceived of the event as a one-off. (The show's perennial title, by the way, is a linguistic amalgamation of Greenseed Studios in Sheboygan, where the inaugural exhibition was installed, and the now-closed Green Room on Indiana Avenue, where the afterparty was held). It is perhaps easier to look into the future from the vantage point of this 10th anniversary iteration of Indiana Green than it was in years past because the next in the series, the 11th Indiana Green group show, is already slated for the Caestecker Art Gallery at Ripon College in 2020. Happy 10th anniversary, Indiana Green - here's to many more for years to come.

The first INDIANA GREEN was organized by Frank Juarez in 2010 in Sheboygan, Wisconsin and featured artists from Illinois and Wisconsin. 






